


ECONOMIC OUTLOOK

The South Carolina Leading Index (SCLI) rose in May to a value (following revisions) of 102.43.


SCLI metrics were mostly improved in May. Unemployment claims were 4.9 percent lower than in April. The number of issued housing permits rose 22.6 percent month-over-month while valuation for the permits rose 19.7 percent. Average weekly manufacturing hours were down 0.5 percent. The Dow Jones Composite Average was down 3.5 percent.

The Conference Board's national Leading Economic Index decreased in May, following revisions, to 106.7. The Conference Board notes that rising interest rates and persistent inflation are dampening economic activity.


South Carolina's total non-seasonally adjusted nonfarm employment rose by 18,300 net jobs to 2,305,400 in May, which was 0.8 percent higher than April numbers and 4.0 percent higher than one year ago. Sectors reporting net job gains for the month included Leisure and Hospitality (9,200); Professional and Business Services (3,500); Educational and Health Services (2,600); Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (2,600); Finance (1,400); Construction (1,300); Other Services (1,300); and Information (800). Net job losses were reported in the Government (-3,900) and Manufacturing (-500) sectors. Natural Resources and Mining had no net change month-over-month. Compared to one year ago, the state economy added 88,100 net nonfarm jobs.

The average number of initial reported claims for unemployment insurance in the state increased in April. The average for the month was 2,136 weekly initial claims, down 4.9 percent month-over-month.

Real Estate & Business Activity

In May, the number of building permits issued in South Carolina for new residential construction rose 22.6 percent to 4,258. This figure was up 1.6 percent from one year ago. Valuation for the permits rose 19.7 percent month-over-month and was 1.0 percent higher than one year ago. Total closings were up 19.6 percent compared to April, while the median sales price was up 2.9 percent. Total closings rose in each of the six MSAs, with Spartanburg reporting the steepest gain (34.9 percent). Median sales price also rose in each of the six MSAs, with Florence reporting the greatest increase at 5.5 percent.


Business Activity

US \$ (billions)











Unemployment Insurance Claims














Change in Average Hourly Earnings of All Private Employees, April 2022 to April 2023
