


# **ECONOMIC OUTLOOK**

The South Carolina Leading Index (SCLI) fell in June to a value (following revisions) of 102.37.


SCLI metrics were mixed in June. Unemployment claims were 25.0 percent higher than in May. The number of issued housing permits fell 11.3 percent month-over-month while valuation for the permits fell 8.2 percent. Average weekly manufacturing hours were up 2.4 percent. The Dow Jones Composite Average was up 6.4 percent.

The Conference Board's national Leading Economic Index decreased in June, following revisions, to 106.1. The Conference Board notes that elevated prices and hard-to-get credit are dampening economic activity.


South Carolina's total non-seasonally adjusted nonfarm employment rose by 8,500 net jobs to 2,313,200 in June, which was 0.4 percent higher than May numbers and 3.8 percent higher than one year ago. Sectors reporting net job gains for the month included Leisure and Hospitality (6,100); Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (1,800); Finance (1,300); Other Services (1,200); Information (1,000); Manufacturing (100); and Natural Resources and Mining (100). Net job losses were reported in the Government (-3,900), Professional and Business Services (-2,400); and Construction (-2,200) sectors. Educational and Health Services had no net change month-over-month. Compared to one year ago, the state economy added 83,600 net nonfarm jobs.

The average number of initial reported claims for unemployment insurance in the state increased in June. The average for the month was 2,669 weekly initial claims, up 25.0 percent month-over-month.

# **Real Estate & Business Activity**

In June, the number of building permits issued in South Carolina for new residential construction fell 11.3 percent to 3,778. This figure was down 9.4 percent from one year ago. Valuation for the permits fell 8.2 percent month-over-month and was 6.7 percent lower than one year ago. Total closings were up 5.0 percent compared to May, while the median sales price was up 1.7 percent. Total closings rose in four of the six MSAs, with Columbia reporting the steepest gain (18.0 percent). Median sales price also rose or remained stable in four of the six MSAs, with Charleston reporting the greatest increase at 7.7 percent.















